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
UNITY PURPOSE:

As a matter of fact I truly thought I was losing my mental facilities. For the life of me I could not understand why it was I couldn't stay stopped using. I, like a lot of drug addicts and alcoholics, was confused and baffled. Why was it that my vehicle at times would somehow mysteriously end up at the dope house or liquor store when I would swear I had enough of using and drinking? I can remember many times after using when all my money was depleted and my resources dried up, I would look in the mirror and tell myself 'you dam fool you have done it again.' Looking back, it's fumy how I remember how I would get a moment of clarity; I would see what using was doing to me. But I still didn't have the power to stay stopped. God knows I wanted to. I believe the Big Book says that a person may have to be hospitalized and then he may have a better chance to understand what the twelve step program have to offer. For me, thank God for the treatment centers. There I was able to have a real moment of clarity. There I was introduced to CA. I knew for a long time I could not stay stopped The fellowship referred to it as powerlessness. I agreed I was powerless over the first hit or drink. Definitely

my life was out of control. The Fellowship helped me see. That's what a lot of them referred to as unmanageability. To newcomers it may seem strange but listening in 12 step CA meetings can help the newcomer identify with the insane behavior of an addict or alcoholic. I would listen intensely especially early in meetings. The old-timers were telling stories a lot similar to mine. I believe that without realizing it recovering addicts do use groups as a higher power. For the mere fact we have asked God to remove the mania of drugs and alcohol from our lives and yet lots of us kept on using. I know now that being restored to sanity is truly a process. My recovery began like this: admitting there was a problem, surrendering, and accepting there was a problem. Understand the problem: OBSESSION of the mind ALLERGY of the body and becoming spiritually bankrupt as a result of the two. But I like to also share this information: knowing the problem is still not enough to keep me sane and sober. I have to go on with the rest of the steps, if I am to be freed from the nightmare of addiction and become happy joyous and free one day at a time.

Traditions Corner

Every C.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

There they go...talking about money, again! Well, it is a fact, that here in the earthly realm, we are going to need money to survive. We have those three basic instincts: social, security, and sex. Many times, when we think of the security instinct, we think of financial security, so yes, they do mention money.

The fact is that a group will need money to survive. There are basic needs that need to be provided for: coffee and supplies, literature, chips, rent, maybe birthday cakes, and donations to the other 'arms' of our Fellowship: District, Area, and World Services. CA has printed an excellent pamphlet that is often overlooked - "The 7th Tradition: Where Does the Money Go?" which will answer questions for both newcomers and old-timers and give some great suggestions, and explains the 70/30 plan.

The tradition also mentions declining outside contributions, which also tells me not only do I need to be supporting the group, I need to not take anything from anyone else. There are a number of reasons for this: it again teaches more responsibility, and also ensures that people outside the fellowship are not telling us what to do...lord knows an addict wouldn't want that!! 😊

If you are anything like I was, I was good at taking things in my addiction, but didn't know anything about giving, at least not without motive. Putting money in the basket taught me a little bit about being a 'productive member of society', and gave me some lessons in trusting God. It never failed, when I balked at putting my last dollar in the basket and not knowing for sure where my next meal would be coming from, someone always just happened to invite me out to eat or something, God always provided!

Many of the traditions that are in place often build on each other, just as the steps build on each other. Tradition One talks about how Unity is vital for the group to survive, Tradition Five talks about our primary purpose, and Tradition Seven is a way to see that both the unity of the group and our primary purpose are carried out. It does my

heart good when I see a new person come in the door, and know that the money I put in the basket helped in a small way to make it possible for that person to come into a meeting hall, and begin their journey into a new way of life.

I know times are tough right now, but I still have to ask myself, how much is my sobriety worth? I still can't begin to put a price on it. God always took care of me in my madness, and I don't think He brought me this far to leave me now!
